#### The Need to Revise the 2009 UNESCO FCS

- It is 15 years old! It needs an update.
- Improve the usefulness and relevance of the standard for member states and other users.
- Reflect current and emerging global and national culture policy priorities (i.e. Mondiacult).
- Reflect current understanding of key concepts and definitions.
- Reflect the advancements in statistical measurement such as advances in data collection and data sources (i.e. surveys, administrative data, big data, data mining, generative AI).

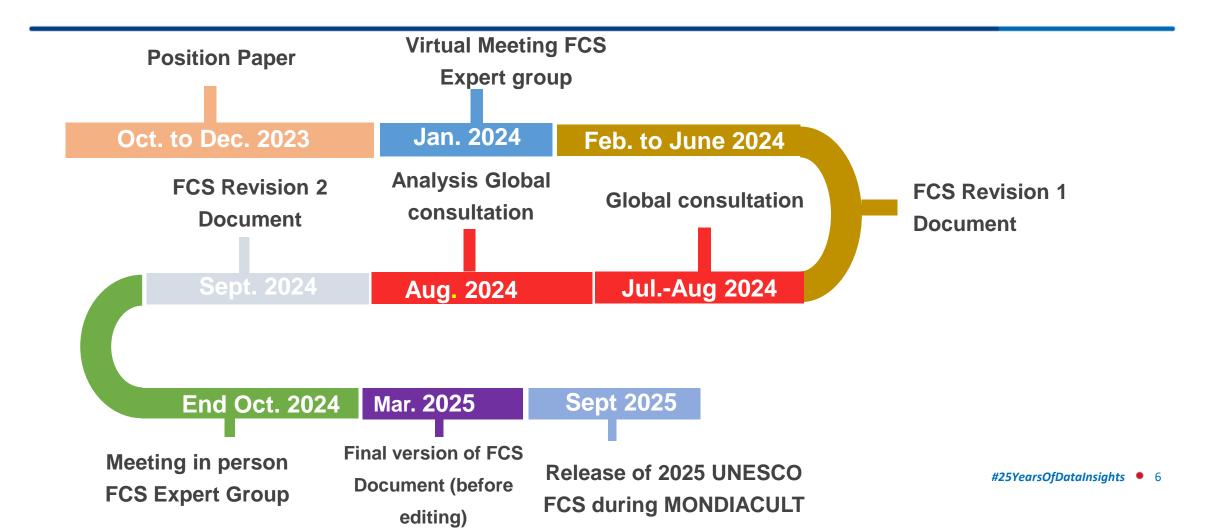


#### The Need to Revise the 2009 UNESCO FCS

- Consider new phenomena affecting the culture sector such as digitization and artificial intelligence technology.
- Improve on the guidance for the measurement of Cultural and Natural heritage.
- Improve on the guidance for the measurement Intangible Cultural Heritage.
- Improve on the guidance for the measurement of the social dimension of culture.
- Reflect the changes in current international classifications.



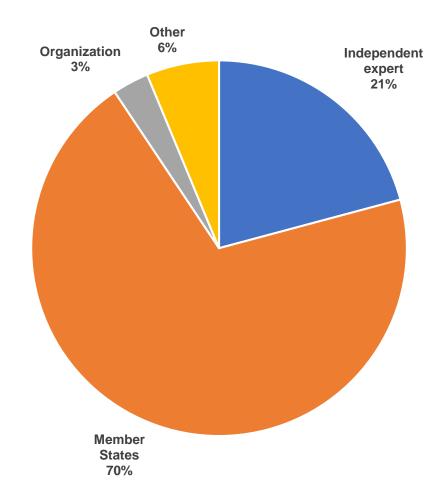
#### Timeline for the revision of the 2009 UNESCO FCS





## **Characteristics of the Global Consultation**

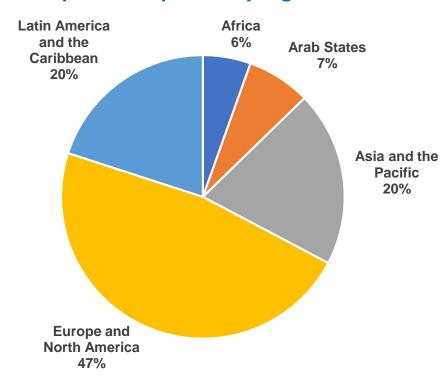
- Conducted from the 11th of July 2024 to 23rd of August 2024
- Online open consultation on the Web: Open to experts around the world
- Targeted respondents:
  - Ministries of Culture and National Statistical Offices
  - **UNESCO** National Commissions, Permanent Delegations
  - Announced to social media network such as LinkedIn,
  - Some Expert Group members sent to their own networks and organizations
- 96 responses
- **67 from Member States representing 55 countries**



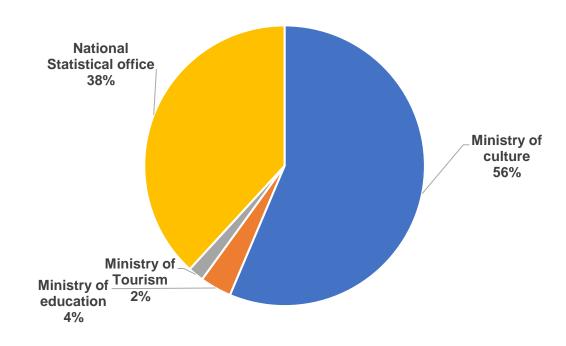

## The 2025 UNESCO FCS: Principles

- **Establishes a comprehensive analytical framework**, guiding statistical operations designed to identify, characterize, and measure how culture contributes to development.
- **Provides essential conceptual tools** to assist ministries of culture and national statistical offices in producing reliable and comparable cultural data.
- Dynamic statistical tool to keep abreast of changes in international standard classifications.
- To support the **development of indicators** and **analytical research** in the culture sector



#### The 2025 UNESCO FCS: 2 documents

#### Part 1: UNESCO FCS Conceptual document includes all concepts, definition and scope

- Measurement of the culture and creative ecosystem
- Update of domains and cultural cycle to reflect the most recent changes in the cultural production and practices
- To be updated at mid-long term

#### Part 2: Classifications guide to the UNESCO FCS: practical

- Identify all codes related to the culture and creative ecosystem using most recent international classifications: ISIC Rev. 5, HS 2022, EBOPS 2010, ISCO 2008, CPC 3, COFOG 1999, COICOP 2018, ICATUS 2016
- Provides the matrix between the cultural categories and the cultural value chain
- To be updated every 5 years to follow the revision of international classifications: ISCO 2028, COFOG, EBOPS 2026



## **Based on two pillars**

#### **Cultural and Creative Ecosystem**

- Complex environment wherein artists, social groups, cultural communities, audiences, creative producers, and a broad spectrum of public and private intermediaries engage in various relationships to generate diverse forms of cultural and economic value
- First level of Division of CCF: Domains

#### Value generation model

- Space where artists, creative producers, social groups, communities, and audiences engage in the development of cultural practices
- Focus on 3 main value generation;
  - Creation/Production
  - Dissemination and/or Consumption
  - Preservation/Transmission
- A different model for each cultural and creative category when possible
- Identify all agents involved in the value generation

## Implementation of the 2025 UNESCO FCS

#### **Next steps for UIS**

- Develop a capacity building strategy to support the use and adoption of the 2025 UNESCO globally and at national level
- Advocacy for its adoption at country level
- Support for countries that wish to adapt the UNESCO 2025 FCS at the national level to develop their national frameworks

#### **Benefits of a National FCS**

- Defines culture for statistical purposes
- Advocacy for the development of cultural statistics
- Is a technical roadmap to produce culture statistics
- Provides guidelines for the extraction of cultural data from existing data sources
- Sets out definitions and concepts for the harmonization of culture variables across data collection instruments
- Facilitates the production of comparable data
- Facilitates the systematic monitoring of national policies



## Challenges for the future and research agenda

- The need to adopt other techniques for data collection / production due to the increased digitization in culture sector
- A vast amount of data in the private sector with limited or no public access
- Continuous improvement of national and international classifications to better capture cultural and creative practices, creation and production
- How to measure informal economy?
- To improve statistical tools for measuring social dimension of culture
